

The Venerable Isidore of Pelusium

Isidore was an Egyptian by birth and the son of a prominent family and kinsman of the Alexandrian Patriarchs Theophilus and Cyril. Having studied all the secular disciplines, he renounced worldly riches and glories and devoted himself completely to the spiritual life for the love of Christ. He was a great and ardent defender and interpreter of the Orthodox Faith. According to the statements of Nicephorus the historian, St. Isidore wrote more than 10,000 letters to various individuals in which he reproached some, counseled some, and comforted and instructed others. In one letter St. Isidore writes: "It is more important to teach by a life of doing good than to preach in eloquent terms." In another, he says: "If one desires that his virtues appear great, let him consider them small and they will surely manifest themselves as great." The first and basic rule for St. Isidore was this: "First do, then teach according to the example of our Lord Jesus." At the time of the persecution of St. John Chrysostom when the entire population was divided into two camps; one for and one against, St. Isidore, this great pillar of Orthodoxy, sided with St. John Chrysostom. He wrote to Patriarch Theophilus saying what a great light of the Church Chrysostom is and begged him to avoid hatefulness toward him. Isidore lived long and accomplished much, glorifying Christ the God with his life and his writings. Isidore took up habitation in the kingdom of Christ about the year 436 A.D.

Orthodox Thoughts from Theo, the Parish Possum



The year 1054 will be remembered for the "Great Schism" between the Eastern and Western Christian churches when the Pope excommunicated the Patriarch of Constantinople. The split was, in fact, a long time in coming. For at least six centuries, the Western and

Eastern churches had developed cultural and theological differences. There were arguments over whether the Patriarch of Rome or the Patri-arch of Constantinople is "first among equals." There was also a dispute about the "filioque clause" in the Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed. The Eastern church insisted that the Holy Spirit descended only from God the Father and not, as the West contended, from both the Father and the Son. Indeed, the Roman prelate believed that he could alter the ancient Creed without the consent of an ecumenical council. In later years, the Roman church went on to declare that the Pope is infallible on theological matters and that the Theotokos, not just Christ, was immaculately conceived. The Roman church decreed the celibacy of clergy and the existence of purgatory which are not shared by the Orthodox church. After the Crusaders brutally sacked Constantinople in 1204, there was little love lost between the East and West. Sadly, there was never a re-conciliation and no ecumenical council to reunify the churches has been possible. While we await the second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, let us not dwell on our differences with our Roman brothers and sisters but rejoice in much of the ancient faith that we hold in common—Theo.
