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The Priest-Martyr Artemon

Artemon was a priest in Laodicea during the reign of Emperor Diocletian. Before his tormenting judge, he spoke of himself: "I am called Artemon, a slave of Christ, my God. For 16 years I was a lector and read books in the Church of my God. For 28 years, I was a deacon and read the Holy Gospel. With the help of Christ, I have fulfilled 33 years as a presbyter teaching men and placing them on the path of salvation." The judge brought him to the temple of Aesculapius, where the soothsayers nursed large reptiles dedicated to this "god." They all assumed that the snakes would bite Artemon. Artemon crossed himself, and by the power of the cross, nailed all the snakes to the ground rendering them unable to move. After that, he brought them all out into the courtyard, breathed upon them and all of them died instantly. All of the soothsayers were in great fear. Upon seeing this miracle, Vitalis, the chief soothsayer of this temple, fell to his knees before Artemon and cried out: "Great is the Christian God!" The martyr then baptized him along with several of his friends. The malicious judge remained persistent in his malice and tortured the aged Artemon in various ways. Once, he wanted to throw him into a vat of boiling pitch but, he fell off his horse into the pitch and he himself was incinerated. Two eagles were seen who swooped down upon the judge, lifted him from the horse and dropped him into the pitch. St. Artemon remained free for a period of time and traveled about, always accompanied with his two beloved deer, and instructed the people. Again, he was captured and was beheaded in the year 303 A.D. and his soul took up habitation in the Kingdom of Christ our God, Whom St. Artemon faithfully served.

As we Orthodox Christians run to Great Lent's finishing line, it is well to contemplate questions posed by St. Nicodemus of the Holy Mountain (1749-1809). St. Nicodemus, who was glorified in 1955, practiced inner still-

ness as a monk at Mt. Athos for over 30 years. In his meditations he observes: "My salvation is a matter entirely my own. If I do not have concern for it, who else will? My salvation is a matter concerning my whole soul and body. If I do not make sure of my salvation, who else will make sure it for me? My salvation is a matter concerning all eternity. If I do not work for it, who else will work for it for me? And what do I do? Why don't I care at all for the salvation of my soul? I do not have anything worth more than this immortal soul. So, if I lose it just one time, I will have lost the greatest good for all eternity. I ask my conscience: For what purpose did God bring me into the world? It replies that God brought me into the world for me to be saved. Condemn the evil you have committed and decide to live according to the commandments of the Lord, for this very hour may be the last hour of your life.
